College News

Alumni Council Endorses Creation of Sports Endowment

This Spring the Alumni Council approved a resolution calling for the establishment of a sports endowment. The DCAC has a continuing need for increased funds in order for Dartmouth to remain competitive in the Ivy League. The Council recommended that the endowment initially be funded by money from the upcoming Capital Campaign and thereafter by alumni and friends. The Trustees are likely to consider the resolution in the context of setting goals and priorities for the entire Capital Campaign.

Rugby Team wins Ivy Championship

The men's rugby team won the Ivy League Championships this year beating Yale, Brown, and Columbia at the tournament. The team finished their season undefeated 10-0.

Lemal top NH Professor

David Lemal, Albert W. Smith Professor of Chemistry, was named 1989 New Hampshire professor of the year by the Council for the Advancement and Support of Education.

Slesnick awarded Silver Buffalo

William Slesnick [how many of you were nailed by a flying eraser or chalk as you drifted off thinking you were in a hidden corner of his calc class?] was recently awarded the Silver Buffalo (the Boy Scouts of America's highest award) along with President Bush and singer Marian Anderson. Previously, Prof. Slesnick has received the Silver Beaver, the Silver Antelope, the Distinguished Eagle Scout, and the National Distinguished Service of the Order of the Arrow Awards. Prof. Slesnick encourages Dartmouth student scouts to return some of the benefits they obtained from the service and has become a master of "giving back" himself.

King earns Huntington Award for outstanding teaching

Deborah King, associate professor of sociology, won this year's J. Kenneth Huntington Award. Dean James Wright and associate deans selected her for "dedication and commitment to her students and to the learning process". King also earned tenure this June (Dartmouth's first tenured black woman).

Some Planning Steering Committee Recommendations

The Planning Steering Committee (PSC) wound up its 18 month study for a Dartmouth long-range plan. The final report is being presented to the Trustees at its annual August retreat. Some of the probable recommendations are: keep the same number of students (4250 these days) with 4300 as an absolute cap; keep the limit on graduate programs to 10% of the undergraduate student body (limit since 1966, excludes professional schools); do not become a "research university", remain a medium-sized, liberal arts college with an emphasis on undergraduate teaching.

The Class of 1994

The newest Dartmouth Class is expected to be approx. 1,050 in size. The College accepted 2,004, 44% women, 19% minorities (7% Asian, 5-6% Black, 4-5% Hispanic, 2-3% Native American, and 5% Foreign). There was a significant increase in the number of students from Eastern Europe due to the easing of restrictions on foreign study by those nations.



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
